

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MEET THE NEW MCA OFFICERS

KATIE COLLINS TAKES ON A NEW POSITION AND ROSS SHALER AND KATE SANBORN PERRY COME ON BOARD

The CLAMOR recently asked Katie Collins, Ross Shaler, and Kate Sanborn Perry some hard-hitting, piercing questions about themselves and their Classics background. Katie teaches Latin at Gardiner Area High School, Ross at Winthrop High School, and Kate at Falmouth High School.

CLAMOR: Tell us your "Classics" story. How did you come to study Latin and Greek? Why did you decide to become a Latin teacher?

ROSS: I first studied Latin in high school. I had been a Roman history enthusiast since middle school, and I thought it would be interesting to read texts written by the Romans. I decided to be a high school teacher while teaching an introductory course at KU as a graduate teaching assistant; working with Latin students was often the highlight of my day.

KATIE: I took Latin in high school and loved it. When I got to college with no idea what I wanted to study, I ended up in Peter Aicher's entry year experience course about etymology. When I found out I could study Latin and Classics for my major I was hooked!

KATE: I feel like I've had a whirlwind romance with Classics. I signed up for Latin at USM completely by accident and ended up loving it so much that I began taking Greek the next year. I got my Masters from the University of Edinburgh (aka Hogwarts), and then went on to do my PhD at Trinity-Dublin and teach at NUI-Maynooth. After 4 years away, however, my homesickness got the better of me, and so I finished writing my dissertation while I taught at USM. I have just started my third year teaching at Falmouth High, and even though my students sneeze in my face and try to sneak their phones to the bathroom, nothing beats that feeling when they proudly work out a tough sentence.

Two longtime members of MCA and former MCA officers passed away recently. **Francis R. Bliss**, pictured,



died on March 16th in Farmington. Francis graduated from Bowdoin College and taught Classics at Colby College, Case Western Reserve University in

Ohio, and the University of Vermont before retiring in 1979. Francis was editor the CLAMOR from 2002 to 2004, and attended many of MCA's meetings.

Art Leavitt died on September 19th. He taught Latin and Greek at Marblehead High School in Massachusetts, Kimball Union Academy in New Hampshire, and North Yarmouth Academy in Maine. He was President of MCA from 1998-2001.
